Floor Rules for the 2026 Campbell County Republican Party Convention

1. These rules, as written or as amended by the Convention, shall be adopted before debate begins on Bylaws Amendments, Platform changes, or Resolutions. **Robert's Rules Newly Revised (12th Edition)** shall govern the Convention except where modified by these rules.
2. The Convention will **not provide individual printed copies** of Bylaws, Platform, or Resolution amendments.
3. Bylaws, Platform changes, and Resolutions will be presented to the Convention as recommended by the respective committees through their chair or designee. Committee chairs are not subject to time limits when presenting their reports and may respond to questions from delegates.
4. Total debate time shall be limited as follows unless extended by majority vote:
 - a. **Bylaws** - one and one-half (1.5) hours
 - b. **Platform** – one (1) hour
 - c. **Resolutions** – one and one-half (1.5) hours
5. Proposed **Resolutions** will be presented in the following categories:
 - a. Government and Budgets
 - b. Energy and Environment
 - c. Crime and Law
 - d. Education
 - e. Election Integrity
 - f. Land and Agriculture
 - g. Health and Society
 - h. Foreign Policy and Defense
6. Each resolution category may be presented as a **consent agenda**. Any resolution may be removed from the consent agenda for individual consideration upon the request of **at least ten (10) delegates**. Remaining items will be adopted collectively by **majority vote without debate**.
7. Proposed **Bylaws amendments, Platform changes, or Resolutions from the floor** must be submitted in writing to the Convention Secretary **at check-in**.
8. Delegates wishing to speak must state **their name and precinct** and may speak only after recognition by the Chair.
9. Debate on any Bylaw amendment, Platform change, or Resolution shall proceed with **alternating speakers for and against**, limited to **45 seconds each**. Debate shall end when:
 - a. No speaker seeks recognition on one side,
 - b. The **previous question** is moved and adopted by majority vote, or

c. The Chair determines debate has become **repetitive, redundant, or dilatory**.

10. **Repetitive, redundant, or dilatory motions** are prohibited.
11. No delegate may **yield, transfer, or reserve speaking time**, and no delegate may speak **more than once on the same item**. A delegate introducing a properly submitted new amendment, platform change, or resolution may speak once to introduce the measure and once to close debate.
12. Amendments must be **germane** and submitted **in writing prior to debate**.
13. Proposed amendments to the **Campbell County Republican Party Bylaws, Wyoming Republican Party Bylaws, and Wyoming Republican Party Platform**, including **plank additions or edits**, may be presented as a **consent agenda**.
14. Any delegate may request removal of a specific amendment or platform plank from the consent agenda by identifying the **article, section, subsection, or plank number**. Removal requires the support of **ten (10) delegates**.
15. Items removed from the consent agenda shall be considered **individually in the order determined by the Chair**. All remaining items shall be **adopted collectively by majority vote without debate**.

2026 Bylaws Committee Report

The 2026 Bylaws Committee met Thursday, March 5. While we did not receive any suggested changes from the Precinct Caucuses, the committee met to fulfill the current 2024 Campbell County Republican Party (CCRP) Bylaws, Article IV. County Convention, Section 9. Committees, ii. Bylaws Committee which says "The Bylaws Committee shall consist of members appointed by the County Chairman. The Committee shall meet at least one (1) week prior to the County Convention or as provided by these Bylaws to draft and propose revisions to the County and/or State Bylaws to be presented to the County Convention. However, nothing shall preclude any Delegate from submitting additional County or State Bylaw revisions from the floor, in writing, at the County Convention."

The 2026 Bylaws Committee appointed by Chairman Norberto Orellana includes Scott Clem, Jim Hastings, Greg Schreurs, and Donna Shafer. We discussed possible clarification, additions, deletions, or revisions to the County and State Bylaws. We tried to update our current 2024 CCRP Bylaws to align with the current 2024 Wyoming State Bylaws. We also updated the formatting.

Our proposed 2026 County Bylaws and the proposed 2026 State Bylaw revisions are attached. In these documents:

Deletion recommendations are shown in ~~red-strikethrough~~ text.

Additions (primarily from the State Bylaws) are shown in blue underline italic text.

An example is shown below:

If approved, the new text will read: 7. A **Platform** is the declared policy of a political party and consists of **timeless** and enduring constitutional conservative principles.

We are also recommending some revisions to State Bylaw wording. If these revisions are passed, we will be forwarding them on to the State. This is another example below:

2.4 All meetings must be open to the ~~entirety of the~~ public, except for provisions of executive sessions in the Parliamentary Authority.

If approved, the new text will read: **2.4** All meetings must be open to the public, except for provisions of executive sessions in the Parliamentary Authority.

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Article I – The Campbell County Republican Party

Section 1. Membership

The Campbell County Republican Party shall be composed of all registered Republicans in Campbell County, Wyoming.

Section 2. Governance

2.1 The Central Committee of the Campbell County Republican Party shall be the governing body of the Party. In between meetings of the County Central Committee, the County Executive Committee shall be the governing body.

2.2 At no time will any body of the Campbell County Republican Party meet in any venue that denies the individual the rights that are guaranteed by the US Constitution 2nd Amendment or the Wyoming Constitution.

2.3 Any representation of the Stars and Stripes on all Republican publications and materials shall have the stars facing upright.

Section 3. Role

The role of the Campbell County Republican Party is to recruit citizens to join the Republican Party, to establish the Platform of the Wyoming Republican Party, to achieve the election of Republican Party candidates who substantially uphold the Platform of the Wyoming Republican Party, and to conduct the business of the Campbell County Republican party.

Article II – Procedures and Definitions

1. All meetings and conventions shall be governed by the current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, Campbell County Republican Party Bylaws and Wyoming Republican Party Bylaws.

2. The use of the masculine shall be deemed to include the feminine gender.

3. At least two (2) tellers shall be appointed by the Chairman of a meeting or convention for all forms of voting requiring a count of individual votes.

4. Wherever the term "casting lots" appears in these bylaws, it means the flipping of a coin or the drawing of names to determine the outcome of a vote.

5. The unit rule method of voting is defined as:

5.1 Permitting a delegate to vote on an issue on behalf of another delegate.

5.2 Binding a delegate to vote in any particular manner.

5.3 Any device which would cast a vote to the delegation as a block rather than pursuant to the wishes of the individual delegates.

6. The term “**proxy**” as used in these bylaws shall require a written document, bearing the signature of the qualified voter, specifying the identity of the authorized substitute voter and the specific meeting at which the substitution is authorized. A proxy shall be delivered in the original or by facsimile transmission, or by emailed scanned document to the presiding officer prior to the authorized substitute casting any vote.

7. A ~~platform~~ **Platform** is the declared policy of a political party and consists of ~~general~~ **timeless** and enduring *constitutional conservative principles.* ~~and should change little.~~

8. A ~~resolution~~ **Resolution** is defined as a **timely**, formal expression of opinion, intent, call to action or an expression of firmness of purpose.

9. Declared Emergencies. In the event of a declared Federal or State Emergency, all meetings and conventions may be conducted via electronic means in which all participants can simultaneously hear each other and have the opportunity for recognition similar to a regular in-person meeting. Any requirements for ballot votes may be waived, votes may be conducted via email vote or other electronic means as determined by the meeting. Other allowances for electronic meetings may be allowed elsewhere in these rules. Any conflicting language in the rules shall defer to this rule.

Article III – County Central Committee

Section 1. Membership

1.1 The County Central Committee shall consist of the properly elected or appointed Republican Precinct Committeemen and Committeewomen who shall hold office for a term of two (2) years or until their successors have been properly elected or appointed. Each precinct shall elect one (1) Committeeman and one (1) Committeewoman for each two hundred fifty (250) votes or major fraction thereof cast for the Republican candidate for United States Representative in the last general election, but provided no precinct shall be entitled to less than one (1) Precinct Committeeman and one (1) Precinct Committeewoman.

1.2 Precinct Committeemen and Committeewomen shall be electors registered in the Republican Party and shall reside in the precinct as defined by W.S.§22-1-102(a)(xxx).

1.3 If a precinct boundary line is changed for any reason, the Campbell County Commissioners shall determine the number of Precinct Committeemen and Committeewomen to which the affected precinct is entitled.

1.4 All County Central Committee members in office on the date that the notice of a meeting of the County Central Committee is published shall be allowed to vote at the meeting.

1.5 The term of office for all Precinct Committeemen and Committeewomen shall be two (2)

years and shall begin on the first Monday in January of the year following their election.

1.6 All elected and appointed officers in the positions of Chairman, Vice Chairman, State Committeeman, State Committeewoman, Secretary, and Treasurer shall constitute the Executive Committee. All elected officers shall be permitted to vote as full members of the County Central Committee if they are not precinct committee representatives. No person may vote more than once, with the exception of proxy votes, regardless of how many positions they hold. The chair may vote on all matters decided by a secret ballot vote or in cases where his vote will alter the outcome.

Section 2. Meetings

The County Central Committee shall meet as follows:

2.1 During the month of January of each odd numbered year after the County Chairman has received notice from the County Clerk that all of the County Committee members have been certified elected, a meeting shall be held, for the purpose of organization, at a time and place determined by the County Chairman.

2.2 During the month of March of each odd numbered year at the County Seat to elect its officers. The County Chairman shall deposit notice of the March meeting of each odd numbered year in the office of the County Clerk not less than ten (10) days before the meeting. The County Chairman shall publish notice of the March County Central Committee meeting in a newspaper of county general circulation not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting. W.S. 22-4-105

2.3. At other times and places as may be determined by the County Chairman or the County Executive Committee.

2.3.a. The County Chairman shall publish a notice of all meetings of the County Central Committee in a newspaper of county general circulation not less than two (2) days prior to a meeting. W.S. 22-4-104

2.3.b. Meetings of the County Central Committee may be called by the County Chairman or upon written request of twenty five percent (25%) of the County Central Committee members.

2.3.c. In the event of a declared Federal or State Emergency, all meetings and conventions may be conducted via electronic means in which all participants can simultaneously hear each other and have the opportunity for recognition similar to a regular in-person meeting. Any requirements for ballot votes may be waived, votes may be conducted via email vote or other electronic means as determined by the meeting. Other allowance for electronic meetings may be allowed elsewhere in these rules. Any conflicting language in the rules shall defer to this rule.

2.3.d. The County Executive Committee may decide that any meeting of the County Central Committee may be held by video or telephone conference in the event of a declared county or state emergency. County Central Committee meetings may permit member attendance by video or telephone conference for reasons of distance, disability, or weather.

2.4 All meetings must be open to the ~~entirety of the~~ public, except for provisions of executive sessions in the Parliamentary Authority.

Section 3. Powers

The County Central Committee shall exercise those powers conferred upon it by law and these County Bylaws. The County Central Committee is empowered to determine policy, to make rules, to settle disputes, and to perform all functions necessary to promote the Mission of the Campbell County Republican Party and to further the interests of the Wyoming Republican Party.

Section 4. Quorum

Those members of the County Central Committee attending, either in person or by proxy, a properly called meeting of the County Central Committee shall constitute a quorum and will be entitled to vote on the issues brought before the meeting.

Section 5. County Party Vacancies

5.1 A vacancy in the County Central Committee or among its officers shall occur in case of death, resignation, removal of residence from the precinct or the county, inability to act, change of party affiliation, conviction of a felony, loss of registration as a member of the electorate, vacation of seat, or failure to elect at a regularly scheduled election as determined by the County Central Committee, ~~or failure to elect at a regularly scheduled election. If a member loses their voter registration due to a routine purge, the County Chairman may encourage the member to re-register immediately without forfeiting their position.~~

5.2 When a precinct person absents himself from three (3) meetings in a 365-day period that person shall be considered to have vacated his seat at the conclusion of the third meeting. The term "absent" shall apply to any member of the Central Committee who does not attend a meeting, and fails to provide prior notice to the Chairman in written or electronic form. Any person providing proper notice shall be considered excused.

5.3 A vacancy in the office of Precinct Committeeman or Precinct Committeewoman shall be filled by appointment of a registered Republican resident in the precinct in which the vacancy exists. This appointment is made by the County Executive Committee. Such appointments shall be put before the next meeting of the County Central Committee for ratification. The replacement shall serve until the next regular election for Precinct Committeeman or Precinct Committeewoman and shall be entitled to vote on all issues coming before the County Central Committee.

5.4 The County Chairman shall submit the name of the new Precinct Person to the state party and the County Clerk within 15 days of the appointment.

5.5 Unless otherwise provided by these County Bylaws, the Vice Chairman shall become the County Chairman in the event of a vacancy in the office of County Chairman.

5.6 A vacancy in the office of Vice Chairman, ~~County~~ Secretary, or ~~County~~ Treasurer shall be filled by election by the County Executive Committee within thirty (30) days of the vacancy and subject to ratification at the next meeting of the County Central Committee.

5.7 A vacancy in the office of State Committeeman or State Committeewoman shall be filled by election by the County Central Committee within thirty (30) days of the vacancy.

Section 6. Officers and Terms of Office

6.1 The County Chairman, Vice Chairman, State Committeeman, State Committeewoman, County Secretary and County Treasurer shall be elected as full voting members by the County Central Committee at its March meeting in the odd numbered years to serve for a term of two (2) years. The County Party shall immediately notify the State Chairman in writing of the names and addresses of persons elected to the offices of County Chairman, State Committeeman and State Committeewoman.

6.2 None of the foregoing officers, committee chairmen or committee members need be members of the County Central Committee, but each must be registered in the Party and a resident in the county.

6.3 Any county officer of the County Republican Party may be removed for cause from their position by a vote of two-thirds majority of the ~~elected or appointed members of the County Central Committee represented~~ at a properly called meeting.

Section 7. Duties of Officers

7.1 County Chairman. In addition to the duties with which he is charged by statute, the County Chairman shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the County Party and shall preside over all meetings of the County Executive Committee, the County Convention, and the County Central Committee. He shall carry out, or delegate, policies established by the County Central Committee and the County Executive Committee and have all general powers of administration customarily vested in the office of Chairman.

7.2 County Vice Chairman. The County Vice Chairman shall assist the County Chairman in the duties of his office. He shall perform other duties as assigned to him by the County Chairman. He shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the County Chairman during the County Chairman's absence or disability.

7.3 County Secretary. The County Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the County Central Committee, the County Convention, and the County Executive Committee and shall serve on the County Convention Credentials Committee. Other responsibilities and duties of the County Secretary are outlined in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised. Minutes shall be provided to any member of the County Central Committee upon request.

7.4 County Treasurer. The County Treasurer shall be responsible for money received and

disbursed by the County Republican Party and shall provide a current report at all regular County Central Committee meetings. ~~He shall report to the County Executive Committee monthly or upon request and to the County Central Committee not less than annually.~~

Section 8. County Central Committee and Executive Committee

8.1 The County Central Committee may select a County Executive Committee and other committees and subcommittees as it from time to time may determine as proper, and it may delegate any of its powers to such a committee or subcommittee.

8.2 The County Executive Committee shall consist of the Elected Officers of the Central Committee. The County Executive Committee may also include up to eight (8) At-Large Members appointed by the County Executive Committee. At-Large Members shall be non-voting members. County Executive Committee Members may attend meetings by telephone or video conferencing. County Executive Committee Members cannot, however, participate by email, text message, or social media stream.

8.3 The County Executive Committee shall have, but not be limited to, the following powers:

8.3.a. To fill vacancies in the office of Precinct Committeeman and Precinct Committeewoman and delegates or alternates to the Republican National Convention, unless otherwise provided by these Bylaws.

8.3.b. To ratify emergency actions taken by the County Chairman.

8.3.c. To further and protect the interests of the Wyoming Republican Party as determined by the delegates seated at the State Convention, or as determined by the party platform, or by the members of the State Central Committee whenever the Convention is not in session.

8.4 Any proposed resolutions shall be submitted to the Secretary in electronic writing seven (7) days before regularly scheduled central committee meetings. The Secretary shall forward any proposed resolutions to the Central Committee via email at least five (5) days before the meetings.

8.4.a. Subject to the approval of the Chairman or 2/3rds of Central Committee members present at the time of a meeting, a resolution not meeting the time requirement above may be moved, but every resolution shall be submitted in electronic form to the Secretary before a meeting is called to order.

8.4.b. This rule does not apply to resolutions submitted at the County Caucus and County Convention, which is governed by State and County Bylaws.

8.5 A County Chairman who is also a Precinct Committeeman or Precinct Committeewoman, shall be entitled to vote as a Precinct Committeeman or Precinct Committeewoman.

8.6 All elected officers in the positions of Chair, Vice Chair, State Committeeman, State Committeewoman, Secretary, and Treasurer shall be permitted to vote if they are not precinct

committee representatives. No person may vote more than once, with exception of proxy votes, regardless of how many positions they hold. The chair may vote on all matters decided by a secret ballot vote or in cases where his vote will alter the outcome.

Section 9. Voting

Only properly elected, ~~selected~~, or appointed and ratified Precinct Committeemen and Precinct Committeewomen, their proxies, and elected officers shall be entitled to vote at County Central Committee meetings and shall have full voting power in elections even though they may not have been elected or appointed as precinct committee members. All County Central Committee members and officers in office on the date the notice of a County Central Committee meeting is published shall be allowed to vote at the meeting.

Section 10. Conduct of Central Committee Meeting

10.1 Presiding Officer. The County Chairman, or his qualified designee, shall preside over all meetings of the Central Committee.

10.2 Voting by County Chairman. If two (2) consecutive tie votes on a question occur, the County Chairman shall, at his discretion, exercise his right to vote as Chairman as provided by *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* to break the tie or to decide the vote by casting lots.

10.3 County Central Committee Meetings will be run according to the County Bylaws or, when the bylaws do not apply, according to Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised.

Section 11. Proxy Votes

Vote by proxy may be allowed at a meeting of the County Central Committee. A person holding a proxy for an absent Precinct Committeeman or Precinct Committeewoman must be a resident of the same precinct as the member he represents and be a registered Republican. No person shall be allowed to vote more than two (2) proxies.

Article IV – County Convention

Section 1. Membership

1.1 Delegates to the County Convention shall be the members of the County Central Committee and those chosen by the caucuses of the several precincts within Campbell County. All County Convention Delegates and Alternates shall at the time of the call for the Convention be residents of the precinct they represent and registered Republicans.

1.2 If the prescribed number of Delegates and Alternates is not duly elected by Precinct Caucuses in certain precinct(s), the County Chairman with approval of the majority of the County Executive Committee is authorized to appoint the prescribed number of Delegates and Alternates from the precinct(s) to the County Convention. The County Chairman shall seek suggestions for such appointments from the Caucus Chairman.

1.3 Each Precinct Caucus may also choose Alternate Delegates equal in number to its allotted Delegates and shall designate the priority in which the Alternates shall replace absent Delegates.

1.4 If Precinct Committeeman or Precinct Committeewoman vacancies exist at the time of the Caucus, the Caucus may elect Delegates equal in number to the vacancies.

Section 2. Precinct Caucus

2.1 Precinct Caucuses shall be held not less than ten (10) days prior to the County Convention or as provided by these County Bylaws.

2.2 The County Chairman shall issue the call for the Precinct Caucuses by publishing a notice of the number of Delegates to be selected from each precinct, the date, time, and place for each caucus, by any means, physical or electronic, reasonably calculated to give actual notice to the electors in the county not less than ten (10) days prior to the Precinct Caucuses.

2.3 Several Precinct Caucuses may be held in a single location. In any year that it is practicable, the County Party shall hold an All-Precinct Caucus at a central location in Campbell County. All Republicans who have registered within the precinct at the dates of the call of the Precinct Caucus shall be entitled to participate and vote at the Precinct Caucus.

2.4 Proof of such residence and registration shall be by the County Clerk's voter list as of the date of the call of the Precinct Caucus.

2.5 *Proxy votes will not be allowed at the Precinct Caucuses.*

Section 3. Apportionment of Precinct Delegates to County Convention

3.1 These County Bylaws may designate the total number of Delegates to be elected to the County Convention. If they do not designate the total number of Delegates to be elected to the County Convention, the County Executive Committee is authorized to designate that number.

3.2 The Delegates to which each precinct shall be entitled at the County Convention shall be determined, as nearly as possible, in proportion to the total number of registered Republicans in each precinct as of January 1 in even-numbered years.

3.3 Each precinct shall be entitled to at least two (2) Delegates.

Section 4. Conduct of Precinct Caucuses

4.1 Either a Precinct Committeeman or Precinct Committeewoman in attendance at the Precinct Caucus shall be elected Caucus Chairman. In the event of an All-Precinct Caucus, the County Chairman or his designee shall preside.

4.2 In the event there is neither a Precinct Committeeman nor a Precinct Committeewoman in attendance, those assembled and qualified to vote shall elect from among them a person to serve as Caucus Chairman.

4.3 The Chairman shall take nominations of qualified Republicans residing within the precinct to

be Delegates or Alternates to the County Convention and shall call for any Resolutions, Platform planks and County or State Bylaw changes to come before the Caucus.

4.4 The election of Delegates and Alternates shall be by secret ballot, if desired by anyone in attendance at the Precinct Caucus.

4.5 The Caucus Chairman shall, within the next five (5) days, certify in writing to the County Chairman the names of those elected Delegates and Alternates to the County Convention from that precinct, and all Resolutions, Platform planks and County or State Bylaw changes proposed by the Precinct Caucus.

Section 5. Meeting

The State Central Committee shall determine the date(s) of the County Conventions consistent with State Statutes and Rules of the Republican National Committee.

Section 6. Notice of Meeting

Notice of the County Convention shall be given by publishing a notice by any means, physical or electronic, reasonably calculated to give actual notice to the electors in the county no later than fifteen (15) days prior to the County Convention.

Section 7. Powers

7.1 The Delegates to a County Convention shall have, but not be limited to, the following powers.

7.1.a. To adopt or amend the County Bylaws of the County Party.

7.1.b. To elect the Delegate and/or Alternate to the Republican National Convention.

7.1.c. To adopt Resolutions and Platform planks which shall be submitted to the State Convention.

7.1.d. To propose changes to the State Party Bylaws, which shall be submitted to the State Convention.

Section 8. Conduct of County Convention

8.1 Presiding Officer. The County Chairman properly elected at the prior March meeting of the County Central Committee, or his successor, shall serve as Chairman of the County Convention. In the event the County Chairman cannot preside, his County Vice Chairman shall be the Presiding Officer. If two (2) consecutive tie votes on a question occur, the Convention Chairman, at his discretion, shall either vote to break the tie or decide the vote by casting a ballot, whether or not, they are a Delegate to the County Convention.

8.2 Quorum. Those Delegates attending a properly called County Convention shall constitute a quorum.

8.3 Proxy Votes. Vote by proxy shall not be allowed at the County Convention.

8.4 Unit Rule. The unit rule method of voting shall not be adopted by the County Convention.

Section 9. Committees

9.1 A Credentials Committee shall act at the County Convention. A Bylaws Committee, Platform Committee, Resolutions Committee, Nominating Committee, and other committees as provided by these Bylaws may act at the County Convention. The powers and duties of Committees, if formed, shall be as follows:

9.1.a. Credentials. The Credentials Committee shall consist of the County Secretary and other members appointed by the County Chairman. The committee shall be responsible for examining and certifying credentials of all Delegates and Alternates to the County Convention.

9.1.b. Bylaws. The Bylaws Committee shall consist of members appointed by the County Chairman. The Committee shall meet at least one (1) week prior to the County Convention or as provided by these Bylaws to draft and propose revisions to the County and/or State Bylaws to be presented to the County Convention. However, nothing shall preclude any Delegate from submitting additional County or State Bylaw revisions from the floor, in writing, at the County Convention.

9.1.c. Platform. The Platform Committee shall consist of members appointed by the County Chairman. The Committee shall meet at least one (1) week prior to the County Convention or as provided by these Bylaws, to draft platform proposals pertaining to timeless principles of the Republican Party to be presented to the County Convention. However, nothing shall preclude any Delegate from submitting additional platform proposals from the floor, in writing, at the County Convention.

9.1.d. Resolutions. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of members appointed by the County Chairman. The Committee shall meet at least one (1) week prior to the County Convention or as provided by these Bylaws. The Committee shall be responsible for drafting resolutions, acting on specific issues of the day, governed by the principles articulated in the Party Platforms to be presented to the County Convention. However, nothing shall preclude any Delegate from submitting additional resolutions from the floor, in writing, at the County Convention.

9.1.e. Nominating. The Nominating Committee shall consist of members appointed by the County Chairman. The Committee shall meet at least one (1) week prior to the County Convention or as provided by these Bylaws, to prepare a slate of nominations for Delegates and Alternates to the State Convention to be presented to the County Convention. In any year in which the Republican National Convention will be called, the Committee may, at its meeting prior to the County Convention, prepare a slate of nominations for Delegates and/or Alternates to the Republican National Convention (as designated by State Bylaws) to be presented to the County Convention. However, nothing shall preclude any Delegate from submitting additional

qualified nominations from the floor at the County Convention.

9.2 Platforms, Resolutions and Bylaws adopted at the County Convention shall be submitted to the Executive Director of the State Party no later than thirty (30) days prior to the State Convention. Failure to submit the adopted Platforms, Resolutions and Bylaws by this deadline may result in those not being considered by State Convention Committees.

Section 10. Order of Business

10.1 The order of business at the County Convention shall be as follows:

- 10.1.a.** Call to order by the County Chairman, or the presiding officer.
- 10.1.b.** Report of the Credentials Committee.
- 10.1.c.** Report of the Bylaws Committee.
- 10.1.d.** Report of the Platform Committee.
- 10.1.e.** Report of the Resolutions Committee.
- 10.1.f.** Report of the Nominating Committee.
- 10.1.g.** Elections.
- 10.1.h.** Other Business.
- 10.1.i.** Adjournment.

10.2 The County Chairman, or the presiding officer, at his discretion, may change the order of business prior to convening the County Convention. After the County Convention is convened, the order of business may be changed by a majority vote of the Delegates.

Section 11. Election of Delegates to the State Convention

11.1 Delegates to the State Convention shall be elected at the County Convention. All County Chairmen, State Committeemen and State Committeewomen are automatically delegates to the State Convention. Each County Convention shall also elect Alternate Delegates equal in number to its allotted Delegates and shall designate the priority in which the Alternates shall replace absent Delegates. Each Delegate and Alternate shall be a resident of the County represented and shall be registered Republicans as of the date of the call for the County Convention.

11.1.a. Election of delegates is determined by the highest number of votes each individual receives by secret ballot. Alternates are then elected in like manner on a separate ballot.

11.1.b. Nominations for both delegates and alternates must be allowed from the floor.

11.1.c. The names of the Delegates and Alternates and the priority of the Alternates shall be certified and submitted by each County Chairman to the State Chairman not later than thirty (30) calendar days before the State Convention.

11.1.d. Each County must appoint a delegate to serve as Delegation Chairman who will serve as the manager of their county delegation on the convention floor for the purpose of voting and other matters as requested by the Convention Chairman.

Section 12. Roll Call Votes

12.1 A roll call vote ("Yeas" and "Nays") or a secret ballot vote upon any question presented at the County Convention may be ordered by the Chairman of the County Convention or can be compelled by a majority vote of the Delegates

12.2 A request for a roll call vote or a secret ballot vote must be sought before the question is first voted upon. The preceding in no way interferes with the right of a Delegate to request a standing vote on questions presented to the County Convention.

Article V – Ratification and Amendments

Section 1. Ratification. These Bylaws, upon adoption by a majority vote of the Delegates elected to the County Convention, shall repeal and replace all Bylaws that preceded them and shall be binding upon adjournment of the convention at which they are adopted.

Section 2. Amendments

2.1 These Bylaws may be repealed or amended only by a majority vote of the Delegates elected to the County Convention.

2.2 Amendments to these Bylaws shall become effective upon adjournment of the County Convention at which the amendments were approved.

2.3 All amendments shall be certified by the County Chairman and County Secretary and shall be filed with the County Clerk within thirty (30) days after adjournment of the County Convention.

Article VI – Severability

These Bylaws are severable and, if any portions be declared void, all other portions shall remain binding and effective.

Article VII – Certification

We do hereby certify that we are respectively the Campbell County Republican Party Chairman and Campbell County Republican Party Secretary. It is further certified that the foregoing is a true and correct copy of the Bylaws of the Campbell County Republican Party, adopted at a properly called Campbell County Party Convention held in Gillette, Wyoming on the 14th day of March 2026.

Article III – County Central Committee

Section 2. Meetings

The County Central Committee shall meet as follows:

2.4 All meetings must be open to the ~~entirety of the~~ public, except for provisions of executive sessions in the Parliamentary Authority.

Section 5. County Party Vacancies

5.1 A vacancy in the County Central Committee or among its officers shall occur in case of death, resignation, removal of residence from the precinct or the county, inability to act, change of party affiliation, conviction of a felony, loss of registration as a member of the electorate, vacation of seat, failure to elect at a regularly scheduled election, or to fulfill the standard obligations of a Precinct Committeeperson as determined by the County Central Committee. *If a member loses their voter registration due to a routine purge, the County Chairman may encourage them to re-register immediately without forfeiting their position.*

Section 6. Officers and Terms of Office

6.3 Any county officer of the County Republican Party may be removed for cause from their position by a vote of two-thirds majority of the *elected or appointed members* ~~County Central Committee represented~~ at a properly called meeting.

Section 7. Duties of Officers

7.3 **County Secretary.** The County Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the County Central Committee, the County Convention, and the County Executive Committee and shall serve on the County Convention Credentials Committee. Other responsibilities and duties of the County Secretary are outlined in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised. *Minutes* ~~These records~~ shall be provided to any member of the County Central Committee upon request.

Section 8. County Committees *and Executive Committee*

8.5 A County Chairman who is also a Precinct Committeeman or Precinct Committeewoman, shall be entitled to vote as a Precinct Committeeman *or Precinct Committeewoman.*

Section 9. Voting

9.1 Only properly elected, ~~selected~~, or appointed and ratified Precinct Committeemen and Precinct Committeewomen, *their proxies.* and elected officers shall be entitled to vote at County Central Committee meetings and shall have full voting power in elections even though they may not have been elected *or appointed* as precinct committee members. All County Central Committee members and officers in office on the date the notice of a County Central Committee meeting is published shall be allowed to vote at the meeting.

Note: All of the above clarifications, additions, deletions, or revisions should have been discussed in the County Bylaws discussion. If not passed, they should be deleted here. If passed, they should be forwarded to the State Bylaws Committee.

The remaining two items below are part of the State Bylaws currently, and the Bylaws Committee recommends the following action:

Article III – County Central Committee

Section 10. Conduct of Central Committee Meetings

~~10.4 All meetings must be open to the entirety of the public, except for provisions of executive sessions in the Parliamentary Authority.~~

Section 13.

~~County parties must adopt and follow the language of this article verbatim.~~ County parties are authorized to add processes to, but not award itself additional powers, nor take away from, or contradict, the specific language of this article.

Proposed Changes to the 2026 Platform of the Wyoming Republican Party

WE believe there are Timeless Truths that will always inform and direct our party and our country regardless of current events and circumstances, changing strategies, goals, and leadership.

These Truths, put into action, maintain, protect, and defend our unalienable rights to Life, Liberty, Property and the Pursuit of Happiness.

Life

1. All individuals are endowed by their Creator from the moment of conception to the moment of natural death with the rights to Life, Liberty, Property, and the Pursuit of Happiness. The only purpose of government is to protect these rights for all.

Equality

2. Every citizen is equal before, equally protected by, and equally subject to, the law.

Second Amendment

3. The right of individuals to keep and bear Arms and ammunition shall not be infringed, restricted, or denied. Individuals must never be prevented from defending life, liberty, or property, and defending against tyranny.

Private Property Rights

4. The pursuit by an individual to rightfully acquire, keep and enjoy his own property is foundational. Every individual has the right to develop his own potential, to use and enjoy his own property, tangible or intellectual, and pursue his own interests, free from restrictions of arbitrary force. Individuals are always presumed to be the best stewards of their property.

5. The Wyoming Republican Party supports the protection of private property from the use of eminent domain, civil asset forfeiture, amortization or inverse condemnation.

Religious Freedom

6. The freedom to practice one's faith is a God given fundamental natural right, secured by both the Constitution of the United States and the Wyoming Constitution and shall never be infringed. The First Amendment does not require the expulsion of religion from public life. fundamental bases of our national citizenship. Freedom of religion, and the free exercise thereof, includes the right to abstain from actions contrary to one's religious beliefs

Proposed Party Platform Plank, to be categorized under "Family Values"

Family Values

7. The Wyoming Republican Party believes in God's created order: that in His perfect design He created two sexes, male and female.

8. Marriage is defined as the union of one man and one woman.

9. The traditional family, based on the foundation of marriage between one man and one woman, is the best institution and is the authority providing children with education and training.

10. The Wyoming Republican Party recognizes and respects biological, custodial parents as the ultimate authority over their own children.

Liberty

10. No medical procedure, modality, or treatment should ever be mandated under any circumstances.

11. Liberty is indivisible from economic freedom. The free-market economy is the economic system most compatible with the requirements of personal freedom and constitutional government.

Government's undue interference in the market, as well as the fiscal irresponsibility of government, results in economic inequity. There exists no fundamental right to the fruits of another person's labor.

Citizen Government by the Constitution

12. The citizens of the United States are the ultimate authority. Governments possess powers derived only from the consent of the governed.

13. Our constitutional representative republic remains the best political system, derived from history and knowledge of human nature, to prohibit tyranny, assure equality of opportunity and protect our individual rights.

Strengthen Plank 14 – Defending the Constitution Against Federal Overreach

14. The Constitution of the United States established a more perfect union of sovereign states, not a group of subordinate subsidiaries. Neither the judiciary nor the executive may effectively change the document via decisions, judicial opinions, or executive actions. The Constitution of the United States may only be altered by the processes of amendment as provided therein. The Constitution of the United States is the supreme law of the land. Under the Tenth Amendment, powers not enumerated in it are reserved to the States and the People. The most effective, responsible, and responsive government is the government that is closest to the People. Government that governs least governs best. *The Wyoming Republican Party stands against any federal agency or program not explicitly authorized by the Constitution's enumerated powers. We demand the elimination of unconstitutional entities like the Department of Education, the overreaching EPA, and the Federal Reserve, which undermine our economic freedom and states' rights. We champion originalist judges who honor the document's true meaning, reject activist "living" interpretations, and push to repeal warrantless surveillance laws that violate the Fourth Amendment. This is our duty to preserve the America our Founders envisioned, a beacon of liberty for all.*

Amend Plank 15 – Protecting Sovereignty and Avoiding Costly Foreign Entanglements

American Exceptionalism

15. The United States must maintain and defend its national sovereignty free from foreign and domestic influences that would infringe on the rights of the American People guaranteed by the Constitution. Domestic foreign policies must serve the just interests of the legal residents of the United States. *America must safeguard its sovereignty by rejecting entangling alliances, undeclared wars, and foreign aid that doesn't directly serve our national security interests, as outlined in Article I and Washington's timeless advice. 17. All taxes collected must be used for the constitutional purposes of government. It is irresponsible to run up debts that are passed on to our children and grandchildren. Taxes should never be more than necessary to meet the government's constitutional obligations.

Amend Plank 18 – Keeping Education Local and Free from Federal Control

Education

18. The Wyoming Republican Party supports the teaching of the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Wyoming, the Declaration of Independence, and other United States founding documents as well as the factual history and heritage of the United States in Wyoming schools and the historical evidence of the role of faith and biblical principles in the founding of our nation. *We oppose all federal meddling in education, from funding to curricula like Common Core, that violates states' rights. 19. The Wyoming Republican Party believes in the state's primacy over water, wildlife, minerals, and natural resources, and the lands within Wyoming that were unappropriated to the state on July 10, 1890, and supports any actions which assures Wyoming's primacy over its water; i.e. the doctrine of prior appropriations, and the land within its borders.

Right to Work

20. The Wyoming Republican Party opposes the unionization of public employees and supports the Right to Work Law.

Civic Duty

21. Our liberty and the continued success of our republican form of federal government demands continuous vigilance by "We the People."

Free Speech

22. Freedom of speech is a fundamental right secured by the United States Constitution and the Constitution of the State of Wyoming. Freedom of speech includes the freedom of the individual to express his or her beliefs, ideas and opinions without fear of retaliation, censorship or legal sanction by government.

23. The integrity of our elections must be upheld. The Wyoming Republican Party opposes any federal takeover or interference of federal, state, or local elections.

Finally, having thus set forth our foundational principles and values, we invite all Wyoming citizens, who substantially agree with us, to offer their affirmation and support.

Add a New Plank – Sound Money as the Foundation of American Prosperity

Sound Money and Fiscal Integrity

24. We fight for a return to constitutional sound money. audit and abolish the Federal Reserve. end forced fiat acceptance and promote gold- and silver-backed alternatives. Limit federal spending to what's truly authorized and pass a balanced budget amendment to stop saddling our kids with trillions in debt. This isn't just policy; it's patriotism, securing economic independence for every American family.

RESOLUTION #1 CRIME AND LAW

Resolution for the Removal of Inactive Precinct Committeemen and Committeewomen in the Campbell County Republican Party

WHEREAS the Campbell County Republican Party relies on active participation from its precinct committee men and women to effectively conduct party business, including but not limited to county central committee meetings, candidate endorsements, and grassroots organizing, and

WHEREAS a quorum is essential for the lawful transaction of business at central committee meetings, as defined by the bylaws of the Wyoming Republican Party and the Campbell County Republican Party, typically requiring a majority of filled precinct positions to be present, and

WHEREAS certain precinct committee men and women have demonstrated consistently low attendance at required meetings, failing to fulfill their duties and responsibilities as elected representatives, and

WHEREAS such inactive members often serve as mere placeholders, occupying positions that could be filled by engaged individuals, thereby hindering the party's ability to achieve quorum and impeding its overall functionality, decision-making processes, and mission to advance Republican principles in Campbell County, and

WHEREAS the bylaws of the Wyoming Republican Party (Article III, Section 3) and related county provisions allow for the removal of precinct committee men and women for cause, including neglect of duty, upon recommendation and vote by the county central committee,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Campbell County Republican Party Central Committee that:

1. A policy be established requiring precinct committee men and women to attend at least 75% of scheduled central committee meetings within a calendar year, unless excused for valid reasons such as illness, family emergency, or prior notification to the county chair.
2. Any precinct committee man or woman failing to meet this attendance threshold shall be subject to review by a designated attendance committee, consisting of the county chair, vice chair, and at least three other active members, who shall recommend removal if the

individual is determined to be a placeholder with no substantive contribution to party activities.

3. Upon recommendation, the central committee shall vote on the removal of such individuals at the next regularly scheduled meeting, requiring a two-thirds majority for approval, in accordance with party bylaws.
4. Vacancies created by such removals shall be filled promptly through the standard appointment or election process outlined in the bylaws, prioritizing candidates who demonstrate commitment to active participation.
5. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption and shall be communicated to all current precinct committee men and women to ensure transparency and encourage renewed engagement.

RESOLUTION #2 CRIME AND LAW

The Basil Stoner Amber Alert Resolution

A Resolution of the Campbell County Republican Party to Reform Amber Alert Criteria and Protect At-Risk Children

WHEREAS, the Amber Alert system was established to rapidly inform the public and assist law enforcement in locating missing children believed to be in imminent danger; and

WHEREAS, the system has saved lives and remains an essential public safety tool when used promptly and effectively; and

WHEREAS, current Amber Alert criteria in many jurisdictions require strict thresholds- such as confirmed abduction, specific suspect information, or narrowly defined circumstances-before an alert may be issued; and

WHEREAS, these rigid criteria have, in documented cases, delayed or prevented alerts for missing children who were in real and immediate danger but did not technically meet activation requirements at the time; and

WHEREAS, the tragic loss of Basil Stoner has brought national attention to the consequences of delayed public notification and the urgent need to prioritize child safety over procedural limitations; and

WHEREAS, protecting children is a fundamental responsibility of government, law enforcement, and the community, and public alert systems must err on the side of action when a child's life may be at risk; and

WHEREAS, several states have begun reviewing and modernizing their Amber Alert systems to allow greater discretion, broader eligibility, and faster deployment when danger is reasonably suspected;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Campbell County Republican Party hereby:

1. Affirms that child safety must take precedence over narrow technical definitions when determining whether to issue a public alert for a missing minor.
2. Calls for reform of Amber Alert criteria at the state and federal level to allow alerts to be issued for any missing child reasonably believed to be in danger, including but not limited to cases involving:
 - a. Custodial or non-custodial parental situations

- b. Runaways where risk factors are present
 - c. Missing children without immediately confirmed abduction evidence
3. Supports granting law enforcement broader discretion to activate alerts based on credible concern for a child's safety rather than rigid checklists that may delay action.
4. Encourages modernization and expansion of alert dissemination methods, including mobile devices, digital platforms, and other rapid-response communication tools to maximize public awareness in the critical early hours.
5. Urges the Wyoming Legislature, the Governor, and relevant agencies to conduct a formal review of current Amber Alert policies and pursue legislative or administrative reforms consistent with these principles.
6. Calls upon federal officials to update national Amber Alert guidance to promote consistency across states while ensuring flexibility to act decisively when a child's life may be at stake.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution shall be known as "The Basil Stoner Resolution," in honor of Basil Stoner and in recognition of the urgent responsibility to ensure that no child's case is delayed by preventable bureaucratic barriers.

RESOLUTION # CRIME AND LAW

As a Wyoming Patriot, representing the grassroots voice of Republican voters in our community, I offer the following resolution for consideration by the Campbell County Republican Central Committee. This resolution aligns with the principles of limited government, separation of powers, and fidelity to the Wyoming Constitution as emphasized in the Wyoming Republican Party platform, which affirms that the Constitution should not be altered by judicial decisions or opinions, and that powers not enumerated are reserved to the states and the people.

Resolution to Promote Judicial Restraint and Prevent Judicial Activism in the State of Wyoming

WHEREAS the judiciary of the State of Wyoming is constitutionally tasked with interpreting and faithfully applying the laws enacted by the duly elected Wyoming State Legislature and the provisions of the Wyoming Constitution, and not with creating, amending, or nullifying laws based on personal policy preferences, ideological views, or extraneous consideration, and

WHEREAS judicial activism - defined as rulings that exceed a judge's proper constitutional authority, override clear legislative intent, or impose outcomes not supported by the text of law or constitution - undermines the separation of powers, subverts the democratic will of the people as expressed through their elected representatives, and erodes public trust in the impartial administration of justice, and

WHEREAS the citizens of Wyoming, including those in Campbell County, expect and deserve a judiciary that upholds the rule of law, protects individual liberties as enshrined in our state and federal constitutions, and refrains from legislating from the bench, and

WHEREAS the Wyoming Republican Party platform emphasizes that neither the judiciary nor the executive may effectively change the Constitution via decisions or opinions, and that our republican form of government best protects against tyranny when each branch respects its proper role, and

WHEREAS Wyoming's merit-based judicial selection process, involving the Judicial Nominating Commission and retention elections, along with oversight by the Commission on Judicial Conduct and Ethics, provides mechanisms that should prioritize restraint and accountability, yet additional safeguards are needed to deter overreach and reinforce constitutional boundaries,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Campbell County Republican Central Committee that:

1. We call upon the Wyoming State Legislature to strengthen standards for judicial selection by requiring that all nominees to the Judicial Nominating Commission and all judicial appointees or candidates demonstrate a clear, documented commitment to judicial restraint, strict fidelity to the text of the Wyoming Constitution and statutes, and respect for the legislative prerogative of the elected representatives of the people.
2. We urge the implementation of mandatory annual continuing education for Wyoming judges, with a primary focus on statutory interpretation, adherence to original meaning and legislative intent, binding precedent, and the constitutional limits of judicial authority under Wyoming law.
3. We support measures to enhance transparency by requiring that all significant judicial decisions, particularly those involving constitutional questions or statutory interpretation, include detailed written opinions that explicitly cite the constitutional provisions, statutes, or precedents relied upon, with any apparent departure from legislative intent thoroughly explained and justified.
4. We encourage the Wyoming State Legislature to exercise vigorous oversight, including the review of judicial decisions perceived to constitute activism, and to respond as appropriate through clarifying legislation, resolutions expressing legislative intent, or proposed constitutional amendments to reaffirm the proper allocation of powers.
5. We advocate for the Wyoming Commission on Judicial Conduct and Ethics to treat repeated or patterned instances of judicial activism as potential violations of judicial ethics and the oath of office, warranting appropriate disciplinary action, up to and including recommendation for removal from the bench or other sanctions consistent with existing law.
6. We request that the Wyoming Secretary of State, in coordination with relevant authorities, maintain and make publicly accessible records of any disciplinary actions against judges related to overreach or failure to uphold constitutional duties, thereby promoting greater accountability and public confidence in our judiciary.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Campbell County Republican Party Central Committee urges the Wyoming State Legislature, the Governor, the Wyoming Supreme Court, the Judicial Nominating Commission, the Commission on Judicial COnduct and Ethics, and all relevant state entities to act promptly to adopt and implement these principles and measures, ensuring the Wyoming's judiciary remains a guardian of the Constitution and the rule of law rather than an instrument of policy-making or ideological imposition.

RESOLUTION #4 CRIME AND LAW

Accountability for Uninsured Drivers

WHEREAS uninsured drivers cause financial harm to others, and

WHEREAS many uninsured drivers never make restitution,

BE IT RESOLVED that uninsured drivers must be held accountable for restitution through financial wage garnishment, jail time, and/or loss of any driving privileges.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the punishment should cost more than an insurance policy.

RESOLUTION #5 CRIME AND LAW

Resolution to Protect Wyoming Constitutional Supremacy

WHEREAS the Wyoming Constitution guarantees that the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects shall not be violated, and

WHEREAS the judicial system of the State of Wyoming is founded upon the U.S. Constitution and American common law, which provide equal protection and due process for all citizens, and

WHEREAS Sharia law and other foreign legal codes contain provisions that are inherently incompatible with American constitutional rights, including religious freedom, gender equality, and freedom of speech, and

WHEREAS several states have enacted “American Laws for American Courts” legislation to ensure that no foreign law or court ruling is applied in a manner that violates a citizen’s constitutional rights, and

WHEREAS the Campbell County Republican Party believes that Wyoming judges must be prohibited from considering foreign legal codes, including Sharia law, in any state court proceeding,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Campbell County Republican Caucus

1. **Affirms** that the U.S. Constitution and the Wyoming Constitution are the only legal frameworks authorized for the adjudication of cases within our state.
2. **Calls upon** the Wyoming State Legislature to introduce and pass the “**American Laws for American Courts” Act**, specifically prohibiting the application of Sharia law or any other foreign legal system in Wyoming courts.
3. **Demands** that no foreign law be recognized if it would result in a violation of a right guaranteed by the Constitution of the State of Wyoming.
4. **Urges** Wyoming’s judicial nominating commissions to ensure all judicial candidates strictly adhere to originalist interpretation of American law.

RESOLUTION #6 EDUCATION

School Administrator Accountability

WHEREAS state of Wyoming finances K-12 education, and test scores are unacceptably low,
and

WHEREAS education administrations are not pursuing excellence,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that administrator compensation will be proportionately
reduced to match student performance.

RESOLUTION #7 EDUCATION

Wyoming Obscenity Resolution

WHEREAS a nationwide effort exists to introduce children to sexuality as early as possible, and

WHEREAS this has resulted in sexually explicit books available to children in grade school, middle school, and in children and teen sections of school and public libraries, an

WHEREAS many of the books would fail the Miller Test for defining obscenity: (a) the average person, applying contemporary community standards would find that the work, taken as a whole appeals to the prurient interest. (b) the work depicts or describes, in a patently offensive way, sexual conduct specifically defined by the applicable state law, and (c) the work, taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value, and

WHEREAS Wyoming Statute 6-4-302 (c) (ii) allows schools, colleges, universities, museums, and public libraries to produce, reproduce, possess or disseminate obscene material without penalty, and

WHEREAS these organizations are abusing this statute to present obscene material to children, and

WHEREAS there is not a legitimate reason to allow presenting obscene material to minors, taxpayer money should not be used for obscenity,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED paragraph (c) part (ii) "In the course of bona fide school, museum, or public library activities or in the course of employment of such an organization." shall be stricken from the Wyoming Statute 6-4-302.

RESOLUTION # ELECTION INTEGRITY

Resolution to Incorporate Paper Ballots and Hand Counting Exclusively

WHEREAS electronic voting systems, such as those provided by Dominion, have been proven to have links to communist countries, and

WHEREAS electronic voting systems are vulnerable to hacking by seditious parties, and

WHEREAS it is common protocol for machines to be wiped clean post-election, thus limiting the retention of tangible records, and

WHEREAS unacceptable delays in election results from elections conducted with electronic voting systems have been seen in recent elections across the nation, and

WHEREAS Wyoming has one of the lowest voter populations in the nation and therefore the lightest counting burden, and

WHEREAS it is the responsibility of Wyoming citizens to ensure their elections are honest and secure,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Wyoming Republican Party supports the exclusive use of paper ballots and subsequent hand-counting, and supports limited use of mail-in absentee ballots only upon special request, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Wyoming Republican Party requests the codification of said requirements by the Wyoming Legislature.

Resolution to Build New Coal-Fired Power Plants in Wyoming

WHEREAS wind and solar energy production produces volumes of non-biodegradable, non-recyclable waste, and

WHEREAS the United States economy is based upon free-market economics where the government should not be involved in picking financial winners and losers,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Wyoming Republican Party supports the withdrawal of subsidies from wind and solar energy companies, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the Wyoming Republican Party requests that the Wyoming State Government cease to subsidize financially, nor give favorable advantage to in any way, the wind and solar energy industries, and

WHEREAS economic development is not a proper role of government. Taxpayer money is diverted from legitimate projects such as infrastructure and public safety;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Campbell County Republican Party supports legislative efforts to defund the Wyoming Business Council.

**Resolution to Protect Wyoming's Economic Sovereignty and Private Property
Rights from Federal Subsidy-Driven Data Center Expansion**

WHEREAS, the Tenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution reserves to the states and the people all powers not expressly delegated to the federal government, including authority over land use, natural resources, energy infrastructure, and local economic development, as affirmed in Plank 14 of the Wyoming Republican Party Platform, which declares the Constitution establishes a union of sovereign states and rejects federal overreach; and

WHEREAS, this federally subsidized boom threatens private property rights (Plank 4), economic liberty (Plank 7), and state sovereignty (Plank 15), as it favors distant corporate interests over Wyoming's sovereign control of its resources and the self-reliance that defines our state; and

WHEREAS, without vigilant state oversight, these projects risk turning Wyoming into a subsidized outpost for national tech agendas, eroding the limited government and enumerated powers our Founders enshrined, while ignoring emerging strains on water and energy that could destabilize rural economies and undermine the constitutional balance of power;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Campbell County Republican Central Committee that:

1. We demand the Wyoming State Legislature enact principled legislation in the 2020 session requiring rigorous, constitutionally grounded impact assessments for all large-scale data center proposals, evaluating demands on energy infrastructure, water resources, fiscal burdens on taxpayers, and alignment with Wyoming's sovereign economic priorities to ensure developments respect state authority and do not rely on federal distortions of the market.
2. We advocate for a state-level commission of constitutional scholars, economists, energy experts, and local stakeholders to formulate conservative policies that incentivize efficient, low-impact technologies, shield Wyoming taxpayers from subsidy-induced market rigging, and assert state primacy over resource allocation, preventing federal overreach while fostering genuine, market-driven innovation.

3. We direct our county chair to advance this resolution to the Wyoming Republican Party State Central Committee, urging amendments to our platform that explicitly affirm the Tenth Amendment's protections against federal subsidy schemes that encroach on state sovereignty, private property, and economic self-determination in emerging industries.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in the spirit of our constitutional republic, where government governs least and liberty thrives, we stand resolute against any encroachment that subordinates Wyoming's interests to federal fiat.
